Oral presentations: Presenters are invited to share their research in a 15-minute individual presentation within a 60-minute session, grouped with three other presenters based on the keywords provided in their submissions. **Symposium:** A symposium is a 60-minute session featuring 3–4 presenters who explore a shared theme or topic within positive psychology. At least 15 minutes should be reserved for audience questions and discussion among the presenters.

Workshops: Workshops are 60-minute, small-group sessions designed to be highly interactive and experiential. They offer participants hands-on engagement with a specific positive psychology intervention, assessment, research method, or tool, providing practical skills and applied learning. **Debates:** Debates are 60-minute sessions in which two or more presenters offer contrasting perspectives on a timely or contested topic within positive psychology. Sessions include opening statements, rebuttals, and moderated discussion, followed by audience Q&A to encourage critical thinking and dialogue.

Poster Presentations: Poster presentations are visual displays of research or practice-based work in positive psychology. Presenters engage in informal, interactive discussions with conference attendees during designated poster sessions. This format is ideal for sharing preliminary findings, innovative ideas, or practical applications in a concise and accessible way.

<u>Dr. Ryan Niemiec</u> When you think of character strengths, one name immediately springs to mind and it is Dr Ryan Niemiec. This is the researcher who has practically built his career defining, refining, and revolutionising how we understand and apply character strengths. With publications ranging unique academic papers and countless books, Ryan has become the go to person about character strengths science – research and application. And he's joining us at ECPP2026 as a keynote speaker. In his presentation, Ryan will unpack the latest systematic reviews on character strengths, all the cutting-edge research synthesised and ready for you to take in. This is your chance to get the complete picture of where the field stands today and where it's headed tomorrow.

Meet <u>Prof. John Cryan</u>, an Irish neuroscientist who's revolutionising how we understand the connection between what's happening in your stomach and your mind. His lab has discovered the link between the gut microbiome and your wellbeing. His research has made him one of the most cited scientists in the world. In his keynote presentation, "Going With Your Gut: The Microbiome as a Regulator of Brain & Behaviour," John will take us deep into his latest findings on how the trillions of microbes living inside you might be influencing your mood, behaviour, and mental health. This is science that could change how we think about wellbeing from the inside out. Don't miss this one, your gut will thank you!

<u>Prof. Shigehiro Oishi</u> is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and recipient of multiple prestigious awards, including the 2017 Society of Experimental Social Psychology Career Trajectory Award. As a professor at the University of Chicago, his research explores culture, social ecology, and wellbeing. One of his most significant contributions to the field is conceptualising "psychological richness", an alternative to hedonistic or eudaimonic approaches to living the good life. At the conference, he will discuss the latest research on psychological richness and how it can be applied in daily life.

Flourishing in Europe

<u>Prof. Dorota Weziak-</u> Bialowolska <u>Dr Sara Ascenso</u> is a clinical psychologist and trained pianist whose work sits at the intersection of Positive Psychology and the arts. Since 2019, she has been a lecturer at the Royal Northern College of Music (RNCM) in the UK, the first arts institution to embed Positive Psychology across its entire curriculum. Her research spans musicians' occupational health and arts-based interventions in challenging contexts, including prisons, refugee populations, and mental health services. Sara is also an Honorary Lecturer at University College London and serves on the board of the Greater Manchester NHS-Universities Student Mental Health Service, a pioneering model of mental health provision for UK university students.

Prof. Michael West CBE is a Senior Visiting Fellow at The King's Fund and Professor of Organizational Psychology at Lancaster University. Appointed CBE in 2020 for services to compassion and innovation in healthcare, he has authored 20 books and over 200 articles on teamwork, leadership, and organizational culture in healthcare settings. He led landmark inquiries including the UK General Medical Council's review on doctors' mental health and wellbeing (Caring for Doctors, Caring for Patients, 2019) and The King's Fund's review on nurses and midwives (The Courage of Compassion, 2020). His work has shaped national healthcare leadership frameworks across England, Northern Ireland, and Wales. His latest book is Compassionate Leadership: Sustaining Wisdom, Humanity and Presence in Health and Social Care (2021).

Prof. Dorota Weziak-Bialowolska is a professor of sociology at Kozminski University in Warsaw and faculty affiliate at Harvard University's Human Flourishing Program. Her research focuses on wellbeing, positive health, and quality of life across organizational and societal contexts. She has partnered with leading institutions including the UN, OECD, World Bank, and U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, as well as global corporations, to develop evidence-based well-being frameworks. With over 120 peer-reviewed publications, her work has earned international recognition including Best Paper awards and Springer Nature's "Change the World, One Article at a Time" distinction. Dorota currently serves on Poland's Government Population Council, bridging rigorous research with practical applications to advance human flourishing worldwide. She will be discussing her research on flourishing.

Meet <u>Prof. Joar Vittersø</u>, a social psychology professor who's asking the questions we've all wondered about: What makes life truly worth living? How our values impact our wellbeing? His recently published book, Toward a Value-Based Science of the Good Life, is turning heads in the field and for good reason. Instead of just measuring happiness or success by traditional metrics, Vittersø is pioneering a whole new approach to understanding human flourishing. In his talk, he'll unpack what value-based science of the good life really means and why it might just change how you think about living well.

Ever wondered what it feels like when your body and mind are perfectly in sync? That's exactly what <u>Prof. Marta Bassi</u> has spent her career studying. As a psychology professor at the University of Milano's medical school, she's dedicated to understanding those magical moments when we're completely absorbed in what we're doing, otherwise known as "flow." Marta has led both the Italian Society of Positive Psychology and the European Network for Positive Psychology as president. In her upcoming presentation, Marta will share the latest research about what's actually happening when we hit that flow state, insights that could change how you approach everything from work to hobbies to everyday challenges.

Meet <u>Prof Rebecca Jarden</u>, a registered nurse, a researcher and an Associate Professor at the University of Melbourne (Australia), who has been investigating nurses' wellbeing. For example, according to her publications, how nurses perceive their lives outside the hospital differs from how they feel about their work itself. In other words, general wellbeing and work-related wellbeing aren't the same, and we shouldn't treat them as if they were. What does this mean for healthcare organisations? One-size-fits-all wellbeing programmes might be suitable for the healthcare community. If we want to support our nurses, we need workplace initiatives that specifically address the unique pressures and challenges nurses face on the job, not just provide them with generic wellbeing advice that could be applied to anyone, anywhere. During the conference, Rebecca will share some of her latest research with the nursing community in the context of their wellbeing.



Flourishing

If you've ever taken the PERMA profiler, an assessment based on Prof. Martin Seligman's famous wellbeing model, you have <u>Prof. Peggy Kern</u> to thank. She's the mind who brought that framework to life, making it possible for people worldwide to measure their own flourishing. But Peggy didn't stop there. She has also pioneered wellbeing models specifically designed for young people in schools, championed systems-based approaches to positive psychology, and... the list goes on. She has been a prominent presence in the field of positive psychology, contributing to some of its most significant developments. Peggy will take the stage at the conference to explore one of life's most compelling questions: Who flourishes, and why? Drawing from a wealth of research, she'll examine what sets individuals who flourish apart and what we can all learn from them.



Wellbeing in Education

Andrea Downie brings nearly two decades of hands-on experience embedding wellbeing in schools. As Head of Wellbeing on the Executive Board at British School Jakarta, she leads the charge from the inside. In 2016, she co-founded Project Thrive®, supporting education systems worldwide to integrate wellbeing and innovation at scale. Andrea has keynoted conferences on five continents and worked directly with over 100 principals to drive lasting change. At our conference, she'll address the critical question: How do we make wellbeing central to education, not just an add-on? Expect actionable insights from someone who's been in the trenches and has the results to prove it.



Dialogical coaching

<u>Prof. Christian van</u> <u>Nieuwerburgh</u> Prof. Christian van Nieuwerburgh is Professor of Coaching and Positive Psychology at RCSI University of Medicine and Health Sciences (Ireland) and Consulting Professor for Growth Coaching International. A certified executive coach and Principal Fellow at the University of Melbourne's Centre for Wellbeing Science, he's a leading voice in coaching research and practice. Christian has authored numerous influential books, including *An Introduction to Coaching Skills: A Practical Guide* and his latest, *Your Essential Guide to Effective Reflective Practice* (2025) and the forthcoming *Radical Listening: The Art of True Connection*. At the conference, he'll introduce a new dialogical coaching model that promises to transform how we approach coaching conversations in the context of positive psychology.

Personality and wellbeing

Can being deeply moved by art help protect your mental health? Dr. MacKenzie Trupp, a researcher at the Donders Institute for Cognitive Neuroscience at RadboudUMC and the University of Vienna's ARTIS lab, is exploring this question through her work on art, beauty, and psychological well-being. Her current research examines whether aesthetic sensitivity, i.e. being deeply responsive to art and beauty, might act as a protective factor for highly sensitive people. These individuals experience emotions surroundings more intensely than others, which can make them more vulnerable to stress and mental health challenges. MacKenzie's work looks at whether a strong connection to aesthetic experiences could help buffer some of these vulnerabilities. In other words, if you're someone who's easily moved by a beautiful painting or a stunning landscape, could that sensitivity actually work in your favour? At the conference, she'll share her findings on this relationship and discuss what the research tells us about art's role in supporting mental health.

<u>Dr. Matthew Iasiello</u> focuses on a fundamental question: How do we measure and promote positive mental health most effectively? Matthew has published influential reviews on psychological interventions and the relationship between wellbeing and illness. Currently, he's working on a mental wellbeing programme for people living with Multiple Myeloma, addressing a significant gap in support for cancer patients. At the conference, Matthew will tackle a pressing issue in the field, which is the lack of consistency in how we define and measure positive mental health. He'll discuss whether creating a clear taxonomy, a standardized system for classifying positive mental health, could help the field move forward more effectively.

<u>Dr Fabian Gander</u> is a postdoctoral researcher at the University of Basel's Department of Developmental and Personality Psychology. Fabian's work centres around how personality and wellbeing are measured, and more importantly, how they change. Do major life events shift who we are? Can intentional interventions help us grow? His research explores these questions with practical implications for how we approach personal development. He's also examining personality in the context of romantic relationships, how our traits and momentary states influence our partnerships, and how these dynamics evolve throughout our lives. At the conference, Fabian will share insights from his latest research on the intersection of personality and wellbeing.



Stop chasing Happiness

Dr. Frank Martela

<u>Dr Frank Martela</u> is an internationally recognised expert on motivation, wellbeing, and meaningfulness at work. As an Assistant Professor at Aalto University with two Ph.D.'s, he has published in top scientific journals and written for Harvard Business Review, CNBC, and Scientific American Mind. As a leading expert on why Finland is so happy, he's been interviewed by the New York Times, CNN, BBC, and Le Monde. His latest book is *Stop Chasing Happiness – A Pessimist's Guide To a Good Life* (Atlantic Books 2025). His previous book, *A Wonderful Life*, was translated into 29 languages. His scientifically grounded but accessible approach helps organizations unleash human potential. We look forward to having him at the conference.

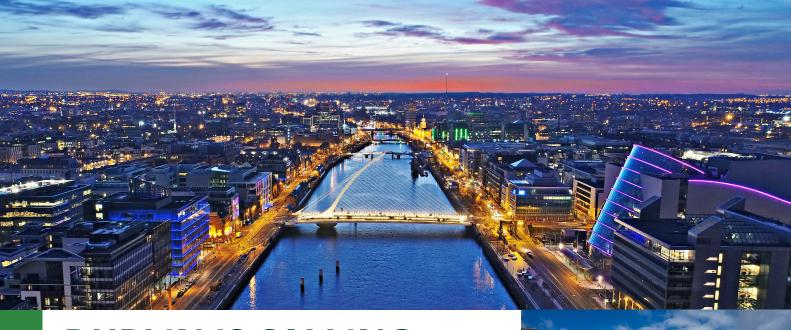

With 15+ years of consulting experience and over 100 scientific publications, he helps organizations turn behavioural science and data into actionable insights about the employee experience. As Extraordinary Professor at North-West University and Chief Solutions Architect at Psynalytics, Llewellyn shows how data-driven approaches can shift employee wellbeing from a cost centre to a strategic advantage. His pioneering work uses person-centred methods and machine learning to deliver hyper-personalized insights that reshape how organizations understand and support their people..

<u>Dr. Shiri Lavy</u>, a researcher at Aarhus University in Denmark, explores these questions across three key settings: interpersonal relationships, organizations, and education. Her research examines wellbeing in its broadest sense, looking at how our character strengths, the meaningfulness we find in our work, and the quality of our relationships all interact to help us flourish. Rather than studying these elements in isolation, Shiri investigates how they work together to support human thriving. At the conference, she'll focus specifically on positive education, exploring how these insights can be applied in educational settings to support student well-being and development.
